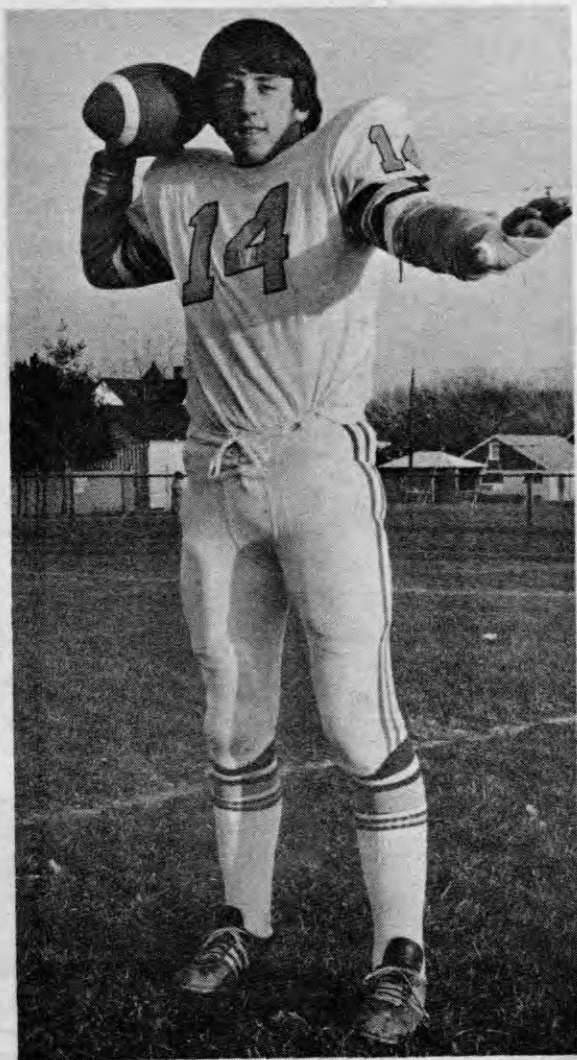

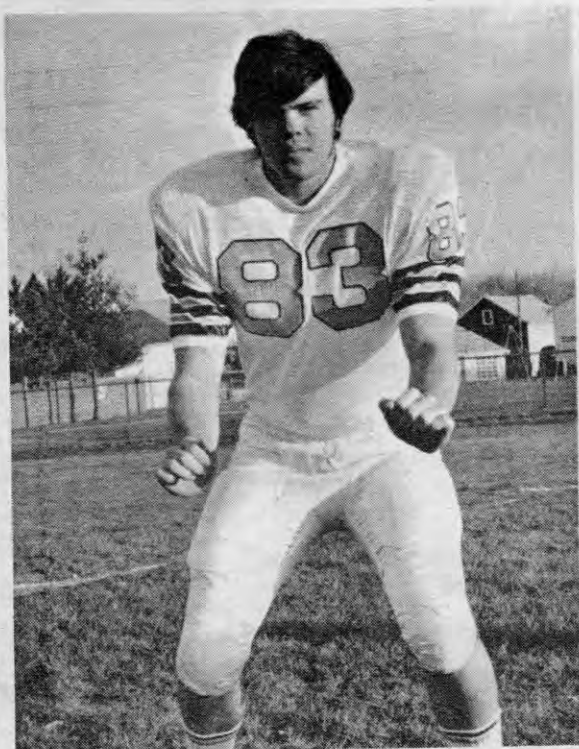
The 5'11, 170 pounder lists Plains as the toughest opponent the Warriors have faced.

A College Prep student, who weightlifts in his spare time, Mickey plans to attend college in the future and continue his football career. He also chose Plains as toughest opponent.

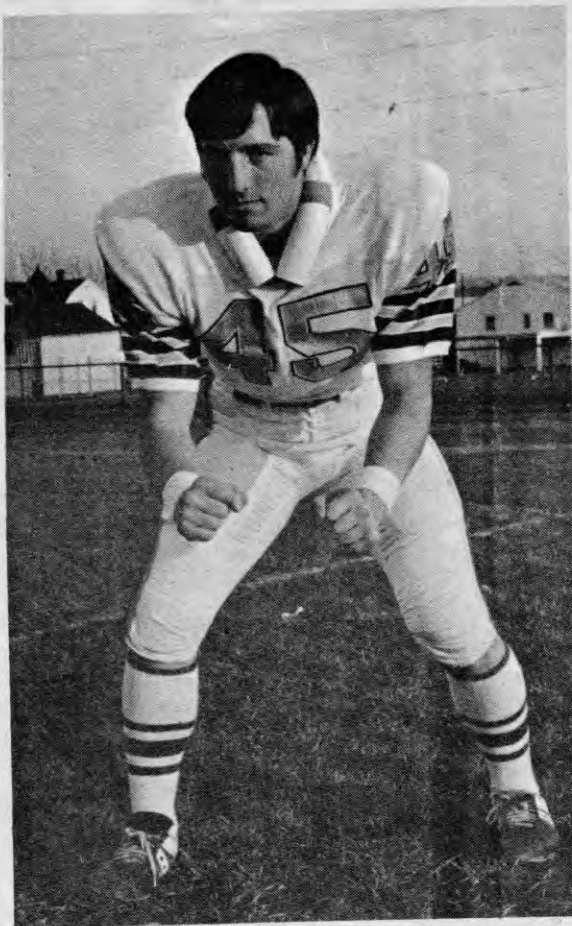


GARY WENDORF

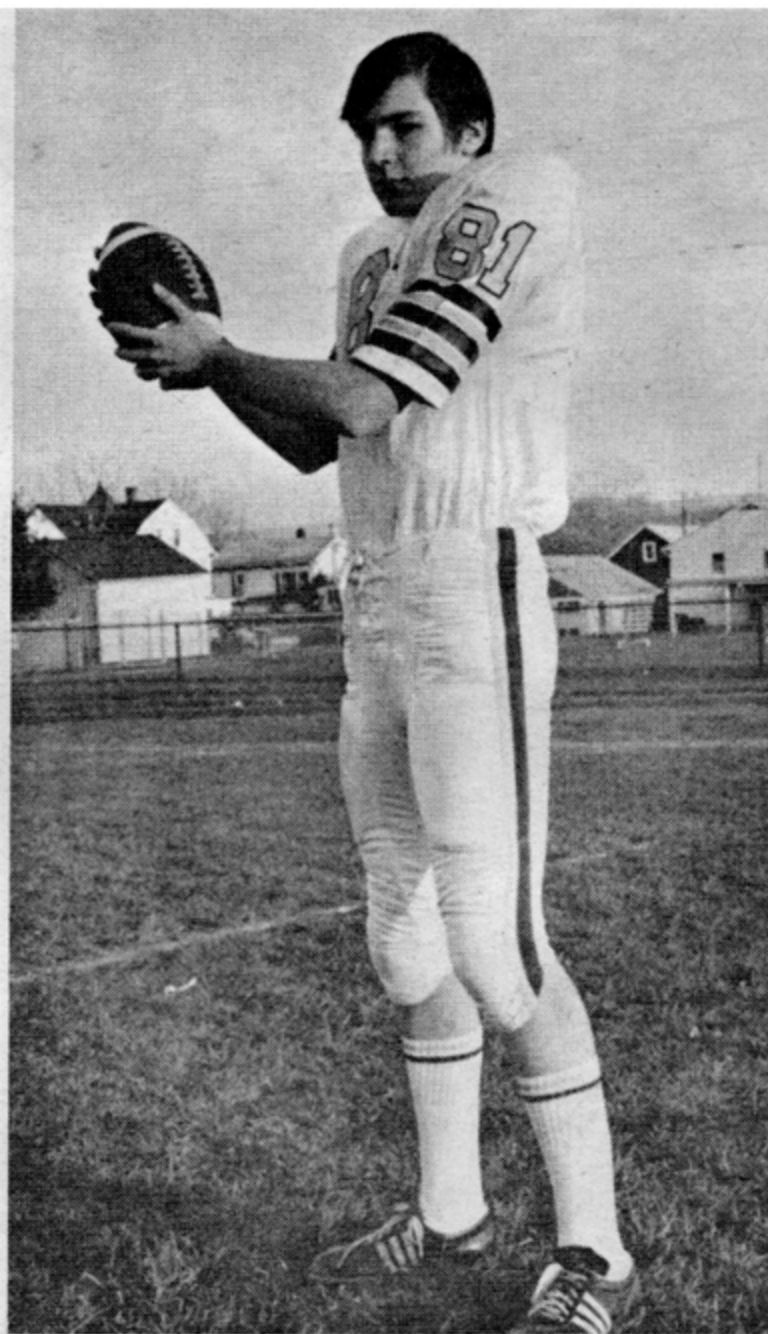
He chose Valley West as toughest opponent.

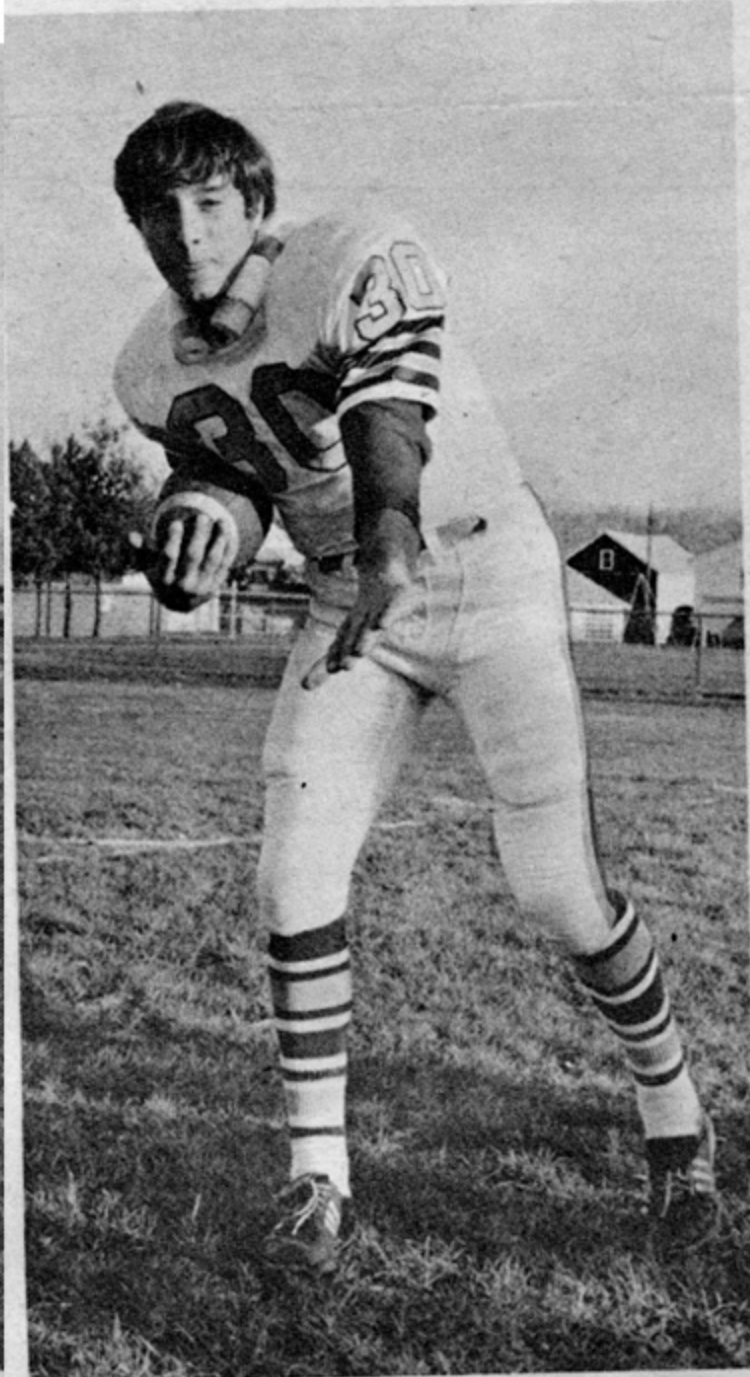

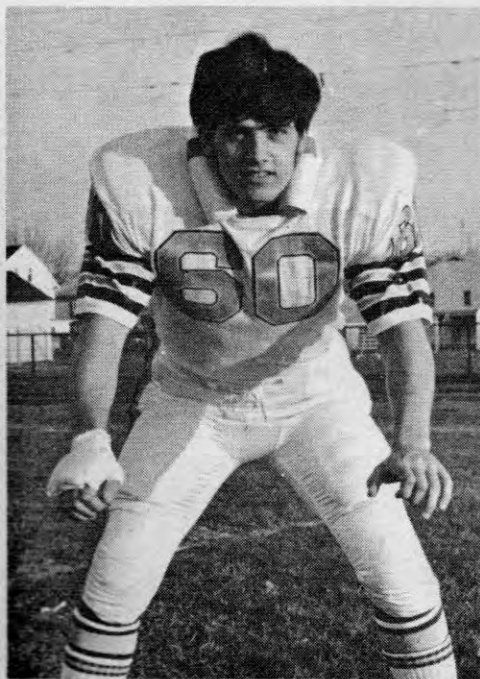

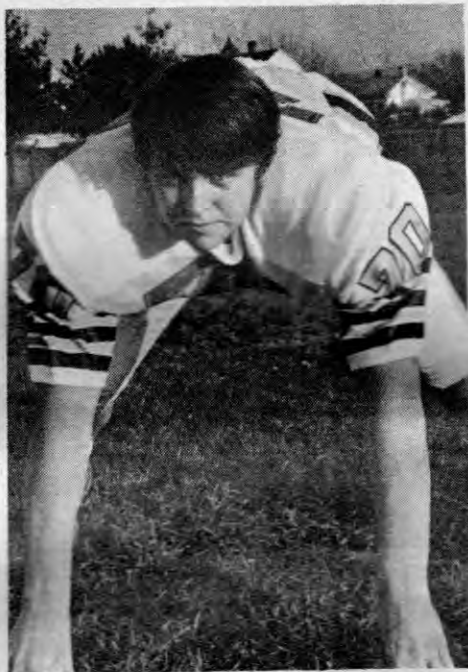
He chose Lake Lehman as toughest opponent this season.

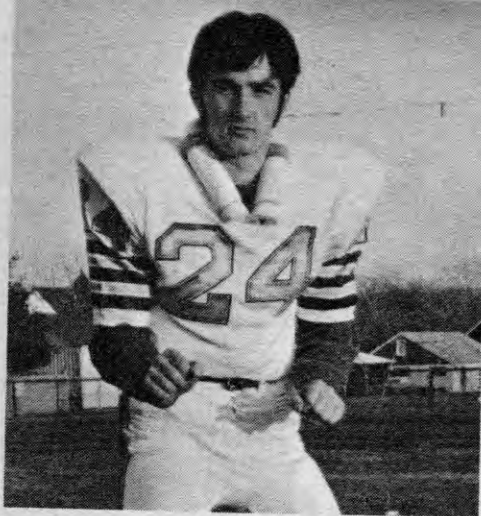
He picked Central Catholic as toughest team the Warriors have faced thus far.

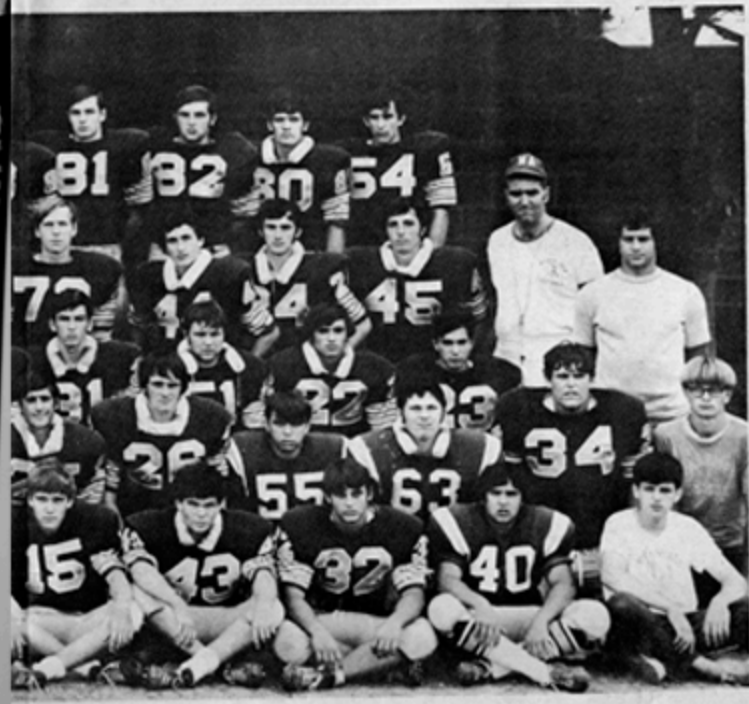
John enjoys weightlifting in his spare time. He chose Valley West as toughest opponent for the Warriors.

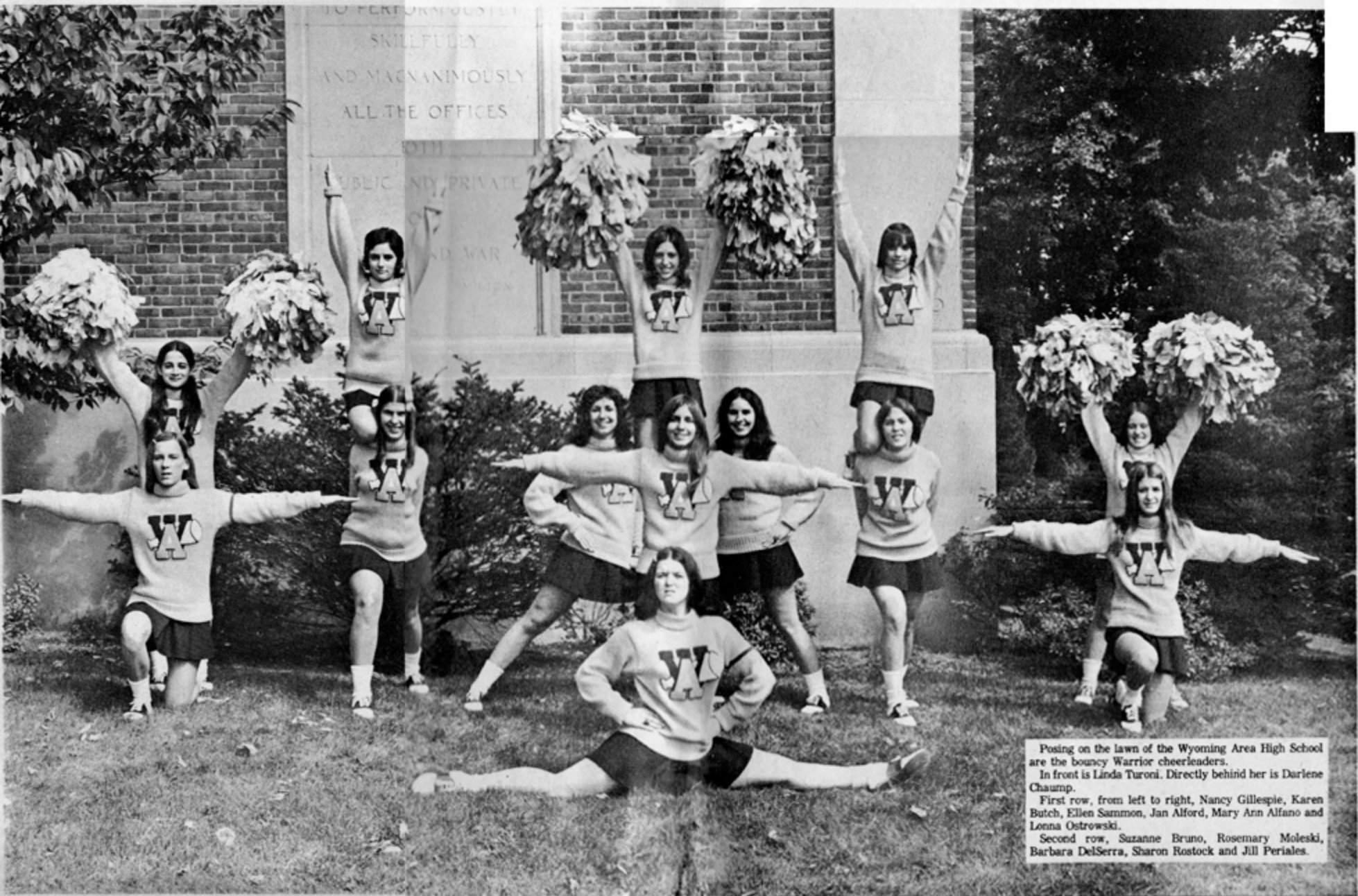

Season In Review

Warriors, 9-1 Lead Conference; PA, 5-4, Had Bright Moments

WA Rolled Thru First Nine Tilts Unbeaten, PA Lost Squeakers

It was a surprising season, to say the least, thus far for the Patriots and Warriors. Pre-season polls had rated Wyoming Area third best in the Wyoming Valley Conference while reserving last place for Pittston Area, but as things now stand, the Warriors have a share of the league lead with a 9-1 record while the Patriots sport a 5-4 slate and boast one of the best offensive threats around. An interesting point too, is that the Warriors have already beaten Coughlin and Wyoming Valley West, the two teams they are tied with.

WARRIORS ROMP

Wyoming Area, defending Conference champions, began the season in fine fashion by trouncing GAR 34-14 in Wilkes-Barre. With Mickey Calabrese leading the way on offense, the Warriors scored almost at will. Calabrese carried the ball 20 times in the game for an amazing 217 yards and scored 24 points on four touchdowns.

PATRIOTS LOSE

While the Warriors were drubbing Central Catholic, Pittston Area lost its first game of the season to Coughlin, despite a valiant second half come-back.

The locals were down 19-0 at the half but made a strong come-back bid in the third period. Frank Aruscavage scampered 13 yards with a fumble for one PA tally and Jimmy Cefalo added the other on a 15 yard gallop.

The loss gave PA a 1-1 slate.

WIN BIG ONE

For the second straight season, Wyoming Area and Coughlin went into their game with each other undefeated, and for the second straight season, the Warriors emerged victorious.

Don McDermott led the offense and John Fumanti, Vince Randazzo and Gene Chiavacci paced the defense which handed Coughlin its only loss of the season. Andy Sney plunged a yard for one

Wingback Paul Tamalenus, who was to carry the team during a period of injuries to Calabrese, rushed for 59 yards and scored one touchdown, while junior Dave Amico added 43 yards and 2 teedees.

Sophomore Harry O'Dell was successful on three conversions.

WARRIORS' FIFTH

In a Friday night game, the Warriors hammered non-conference opponent Scranton Prep 31-6 for their fifth straight win.

Paul Tamalenus led the way with 92 yards rushing in only 7 carries and 22 points scored. Quarterback Don McDermott added the other TD on a slippery 24 yard jaunt while John Fumanti added a two point conversion and Harry O'Dell kicked one extra point.

Stan Waleski of Avoca scored Prep's only touchdown on a 21 yard run.

PATRIOTS ROLL

That night, Pittston Area continued its mastery over Old Forge with a 29-15 victory. The Patriot offense, which was already being billed the best in the region, racked up 352 total yards with Ray Musto passing for 161 yards and Jimmy Cefalo running for 99 yards in 10 carries.

Cefalo scored three touchdowns, Ed Jakaboski added a touchdown and a two point conversion, Lou Spiccioli made a two point conversion and John Morreale, who was injured and has been sidelined since, kicked an extra point.

PA's record was then 4 wins, 2 losses.

CLOSE CALL

Wyoming Area continued their winning streak against Nanticoke but it was a close call as the locals won 12-10 on a last minute 21 yard touchdown run by Don McDermott.

Mickey Calabrese, who rushed for 197 yards in 37 carries, kept the Warriors in the game by scoring the first touchdown, but the locals

scored two touchdowns for the Patriots, whose record dropped to 4-4.

WARRIORS ROMP

A strong over-all performance gave Wyoming Area an impressive 39-12 win over Old Forge as the varsity played only half the game. The locals built a 26-0 halftime lead as they garnered 15 first downs while not allowing the Blue Devils any.

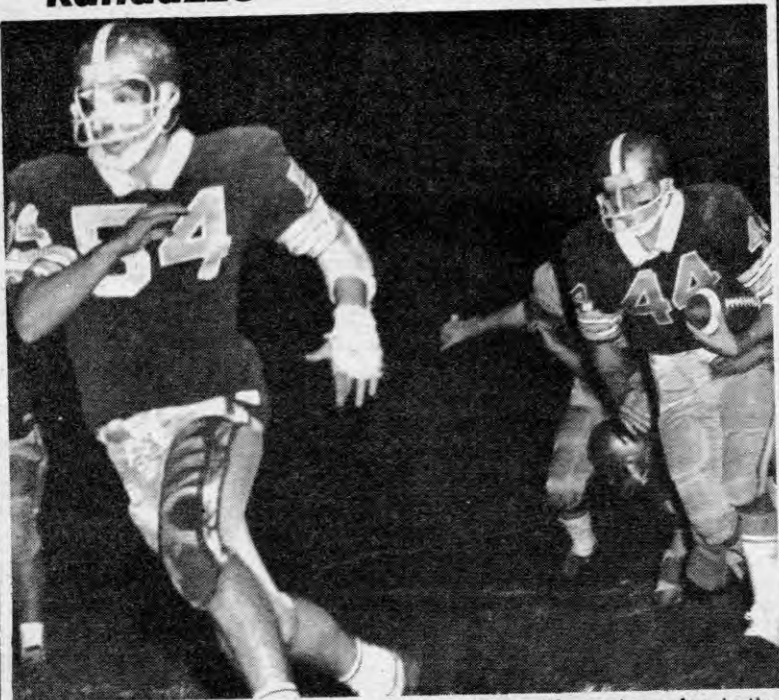
Junior Dave Amico stole the show with 101 yards total offense and three touchdowns. Quarterback Don McDermott, who usually doesn't pass much, completed 6 of 12 aerials for 129 yards.

Paul Tamalenus, Mickey Calabrese and John Fumanti also added touchdowns.

PATRIOTS EXPLODE

That fantastic Patriot offense humbled Plains 48-6 in PA's last outing as the first stringers saw only two quarters of action. In the first half, Pittston Area rolled up 254 yards total offense compared to minus 20 for Plains.
